

Do not touch the electrical distribution box

Never touch live wires, the main breaker, bus bars, or any exposed electrical components inside a distribution box unless you are a qualified electrician.

Key Components to Avoid

- **Live Wires:** These carry high-voltage electricity from the utility into your home. Contact can result in severe electric shock or death, even if the power appears off .
- **Main Breaker:** Controls the entire electrical supply to your home. Tampering with it can cause electrocution or fire .
- **Bus Bars:** These metal strips distribute electricity to individual breakers. Touching them can lead to serious injury .
- **Circuit Breakers (when warm or frequently tripped):** Only flip breakers if you are certain it is safe. Do not attempt to replace or reset breakers that feel hot or malfunctioning .
- **Ground Wires:** Although designed for safety, interfering with them can disrupt protective mechanisms and cause shocks .

Safety Practices

- **Keep the cover on:** The “dead front cover” protects you from live components. Never remove it unless necessary and only with proper training .
- **Use insulated tools and protective gear:** Always wear gloves and safety equipment if you must work near the panel
